Social development is very much about teaching children an acceptability in their actions and about them belonging in our school and our community. This relies on us teaching them to become socially aware, giving them the ability and opportunity to adjust to a variety of social contexts and being able to apply appropriate and sensitive behaviour. We teach our children to relate to others and take as many opportunities as possible to develop cultural capital.

Within school, pupils develop responsibility as they move through school taking on a number of class and whole school roles such as mini leaders, anti-stigmas ambassadors, music maestros, ECO ambassadors, reading buddies, register monitors and school councillors. These roles provide children with the opportunity to engage in democratic processes and demonstrate leadership skills.



Our pupils learn about and experience the diversity of other cultures in both modern Britain and throughout the world and history. This is achieved through a carefully thought out programme of events over the year including visits, assemblies, projects, theme days and our exceptional curriculum.
